It is the student's responsibility to verify administrative drops for excessive absences through MySPC using his or her student online account. Each posting requires that you post an original message and reply to at least 2 of your classmates postings. To submit a completed discussion posting, you must meet the following requirements:

- a. Original Message requirements: (30 points)
- Meet posting deadline
- · Minimum of 400 words in length
- · Make direct connections between video and/or supplemental reading and the textbook.
- · Include personal experiences and/or reactions
- · Use correct grammar and complete sentences.

- b. Comment to at least 2 of your classmates postings: (5 points each)
- · Meet posting deadline
- · Minimum of 300 words in length for each posting
- · Provide constructive feedback and/or ask thought provoking questions
- · Include personal experiences and/or elaborate on their ideas.
- · Use correct grammar and complete sentences.
- 3. Exams (4 at 80 points each)

4. Research Paper - This assignment is for the students enrolled in the honors course: Research topic to be discussed with professor during the first week of the course. This paper will be worth 100 points.
